Edibles

Have you just put seed potatoes out on windowsills to chit or ordered veggie seeds for growing at home? As the growing season gets into gear once more (despite the freezing temperatures), CPRE is taking a look at food and farming. At the Oxford Real Farming Conference early in January, the national team helped to facilitate <u>debate on the post-Brexit future of farming</u>.

Here in Gloucestershire, we are blessed with many local food outlets and produce unique to the County. We have heritage orchards, community orchards (including a new one at Berry Hill in the Forest of Dean), farm shops, farmers' markets, pick-your-own and community farms, food co-operatives in Stroud and the Forest of Dean besides many of our local supermarkets stocking local produce. CPRE has always supported local food producers for the value that they add to the local economy, the vitality and variety that they bring to communities and the obvious benefit in terms of low food miles. To help you access local food, defined by being



sourced within a 30 mile radius, CPRE has produced this new booklet: <u>Local food – your pocket</u> guide.

An important part of our work as an environmental charity is to produce up-to-date and relevant information. CPRE Gloucestershire has supported national office to produce much needed advice on improving the visual aspects of photo-voltaic installations on buildings. Detailed guidance for designers, manufactures and installers has been produced, together with a handy pocket-sized booklet aimed at home owners – Solar Design Tips: your 10 point guide.
